^a Final numbers for FY 2008 reflect an across the board cut of 1.747% in all non-defense and non-homeland security spending.

^b Beginning in FY 2008, several education, health, welfare, and children's programs within the Labor-HHS bill were framed as a "Reducing the Need for Abortions" Initiative. The inclusion of this language ties together programs which help prevent teen and unplanned pregnancy, encourage women to carry their pregnancies to term, and provide support for new parents who have economic difficulties. The framework is actually in the Joint Explanatory Statement Section rather than in the HHS component of the appropriations.

^c President Bush and the Congress were at an impasse and could not reach an agreement on 2009 funding levels, and the House and Senate chose not to pass any appropriations bills until a new President took office in January 2009. For this reason, all programs whose funding is annually appropriated through this process were operating under a continuing resolution at FY 2008 funding levels until the FY09 omnibus appropriations bill was enacted in March 2009.

^d President's budget identifies \$4 million within this amount for longitudinal evaluations of teen pregnancy prevention approaches, which is *in addition* to the \$4.5 million for evaluations in Section 241 of the PHS Act.

^e This program is not subject to annual appropriations. The health reform bill that passed the Senate on 12/24/09, H.R. 3590 - the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, includes Sec. 2954 to restore \$50 million/year for the mandatory abstinence grants for FY10-FY14.

^f This program is not subject to annual appropriations. The health reform bill that passed the Senate on 12/24/09, H.R. 3590 - the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, includes Sec. 2953 which creates the Personal Responsibility Education program, which would provide \$75 million in mandatory funds each year for FY 2010 through FY 2014 for teen pregnancy prevention programs. If included in the final health reform package, each year, \$50 million in formula grants would be available to states for evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs. The remaining \$25 million would be available for states and communities to fund innovative approaches to teen pregnancy prevention (particularly for working with at-risk youth), grants to tribes, and for research, training and technical assistance.

^g The President's budget requests \$50 million annually in mandatory funding for teen pregnancy prevention (\$500 million over FY 2011 to FY2020). This program would not be subject to annual appropriations.

^h The FY 2010 conference agreement does not provide funding requested by the President and approved by the House for the Adolescent Family Life program to carry out effective teenage pregnancy prevention programs. It does however provide funding for "care grants" for teen parents.

ⁱ Not subject to annual appropriations. Both the House (H.R. 3962) and Senate (H.R. 3590) health reform bills contain a provision that would establish a state option to expand Medicaid family planning services up to the state's eligibility level for pregnancy-related care.

^j The FY 2010 conference agreement does not provide funding for the Strengthening Communities Fund. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) provided \$50 million through September 30, 2010 for this purpose.

^k The current Healthy Marriage and Responsible Fatherhood funds will be redirected to the new Fatherhood, Marriage, and Families Innovation Fund.

^l The Administration's request establishes a Fatherhood, Marriage, and Families Innovation Fund to support States' development, implementation and evaluation of: a) comprehensive responsible fatherhood programs that rely on strong partnerships with community-based organizations; and b) comprehensive family demonstrations geared towards improving child outcomes.

^m The Administration has requested funding for a reformed 21st Century Community Learning Centers program as part of its new Supporting Student Success initiative. The program would support centers that serve students through activities that improve their academic achievement by providing additional time for students to engage in learning and providing access to comprehensive supports that promote academic achievement as well as mental and physical health.

ⁿ The Administration has requested funding for Successful, Safe, and Healthy Students as part of its new Supporting Student Success initiative. Funds would support competitive grants and other activities to assist States, local educational agencies (LEAs), and partnerships between LEAs and non-profit organizations or local government entities in improving school climate; reducing or preventing drug use, violence, or harassment; and promoting and supporting the physical and mental well-being of students so that schools are safe, healthy, and drug-free environments.

^o The FY 2010 conference agreement includes \$20 million to fund demonstration projects that aim to improve the outcomes for children and families, particularly those with long-term involvement in foster care. The demonstration program will take a multi-faceted approach to reduce the number of children who stay in foster care for extended periods of time and encourages an upfront investment in evidence-based or evidence-informed services.

^p The conference agreement does not fund the President's FY10 budget request for the expansion of the CDC's safe motherhood program, which promotes evidence-based interventions for teen pregnancy prevention.

^q The proposed funding for CDC Safe Motherhood Program includes \$22 million for an expansion of the "Promoting Science-Based Approaches" (PSBA) project, which promotes evidence-based interventions for teen pregnancy prevention. The increased funding for the PSBA project includes \$7 million over FY 2010 appropriated levels for five national groups, regional training centers, and 22 state teen pregnancy prevention coalitions.

^r Not subject to annual appropriations. The House health reform bill (H.R. 3962) includes language to provide a total of \$750 million in mandatory funding for the program between FY 2010 and FY 2014, and the Senate version (H.R. 3590) provides \$1.5 billion in mandatory funding for the program between FY 2010 and FY 2014.

^s There is no separate funding requested for home visitation programs. However, funding is including in the pending health reform bills and such programs are an allowable activity within the new Fatherhood, Marriage, and Families Innovation Fund.

^t The Administration has requested funding for Promise Neighborhoods as part of its new Supporting Student Success initiative. Funds would support competitive grants and other activities for projects designed to significantly improve the educational and developmental outcomes of children within the Nation's most distressed communities, with the goal of transforming those communities so that all children in the community have access to a cradle-through-college-and-career continuum of academic programs and community supports, including effective schools and services.

^v The FY 2010 conference agreement includes \$30 million for a new competitive grant program to provide transitional jobs activities instead of \$35 million as proposed by the House and \$40 million as proposed by the Senate. The conference agreement provides an additional \$15 million for these activities within the Reintegration of Ex-Offenders program, resulting in a total of \$45 million for transitional jobs activities.

^x Of the \$108 million provided in the FY 2010 conference agreement, \$15 million is dedicated to transitional jobs activities as noted above in the Transitional Jobs program.

^y Not subject to annual appropriations. The House-passed version of the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2009 includes a total of \$3 billion in mandatory funds over 5 years (\$600 million each year from FY 2010 to FY 2014) for this program. Senate action is pending.

^z The President's budget requests \$700 million for FY 2011 (\$3.5 billion over 7 years) for a College Access and Completion Fund, which would make grants to States, institutions of higher education, and other organizations to support innovative strategies to increase the number and percentage of students entering and completing college.

^{aa} Not subject to annual appropriations. The House-passed version of the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2009 includes a total of \$7 billion in mandatory funds over 10 years (\$730 million for each of the fiscal years 2010 through 2013, and \$680 million for each of the fiscal years 2014 through 2019) for this program. Senate action is pending.

^{bb} The President's budget requests \$2.5 billion for FY 2011 (\$10.6 billion over 10 years) for the American Graduation Initiative to strengthen and support community colleges, focus on college completion and graduate 5 million more students by 2020. The American Graduation Initiative contains three components: challenge grants, community college renovation, and online skills funding.
